Senate Notes

A permanent College Committee to review and recommend change to the student handbook. The College Administrative Council was established by action of the Student Senate meeting Tuesday, Nov. 28.

Herbie Mann Plays Homecoming Concert

Student Activities Committee at Rio Grande College will present a Herbie Mann concert Friday, Dec. 1, from 8 until 11 p.m. at the Lyne Center.

In the last decade, Herbie Mann has established himself as the outstanding flutist in jazz, but in addition, he has also managed to become one of a handful of musicians rooted in jazz who has also made a significant breakthrough as a pop attraction as well.

Based in New York, Herbie has established himself as an international attraction as a concert artist. In New York he works constantly at various clubs and in concert and is always a big drawing card.

His consistency as a record seller in jazz, pop, Latin and recently rhythm and blues has led to Atlantic Records providing him with Embryo Records to record his ever-changing contemporary works. His various "live" albums from the Newport Jazz Festival and the Village Gate continue to be big sellers in the Atlantic catalogue.

The noted flutist was born in Brooklyn, New York of Romanian and Russian parentage. He started playing piano at the age of six, but three years later switched to clarinet, and within a few years to tenor saxophone and eventually flute.

Herbie has gone to various parts

of the world — Africa, South America, Europe, the Middle East, and even Japan to go to the very source of the many types of music he has featured in order to authenticate his musical presentation.

The Herbie Mann Concert at Lyne Center on the Rio Grande College campus will be a one-time appearance. The only performance will be Friday at 8 p.m. and it is open to the public.

The concert is open to the public and tickets may be purchased at the door for \$2 per person.

COLLEGE CLUSTER

British Debate With Rio Speakers

Two debaters from Oxford University, Julian Priestly of Plymouth, England, and Peter Haywood of South London, debated

the topic "Resolved: that the busing of school children does not represent a significant advance toward the solution of racial problems," in the college cafeteria

on November 21.

Rio Grande students participated in the debate, which was conducted under the British Parliamentary Rules. Ray Belville joined Mr. Priestly in affirming the proposition, while Larry Ewing and Mr. Haywood defended the negative. All four speakers answered questions from the audience before the Oxford debaters presented their summary statements.

The British debaters, who are participants in a program sponsored by the Committee for International Education and the Speech Association of America, were on campus between November 21 and 26. In addition to engaging in formal debate, the two spoke before the Wellston Rotary Club, appeared on WCHS television's "Point of View," and were interviewed by WSAZ-TV.

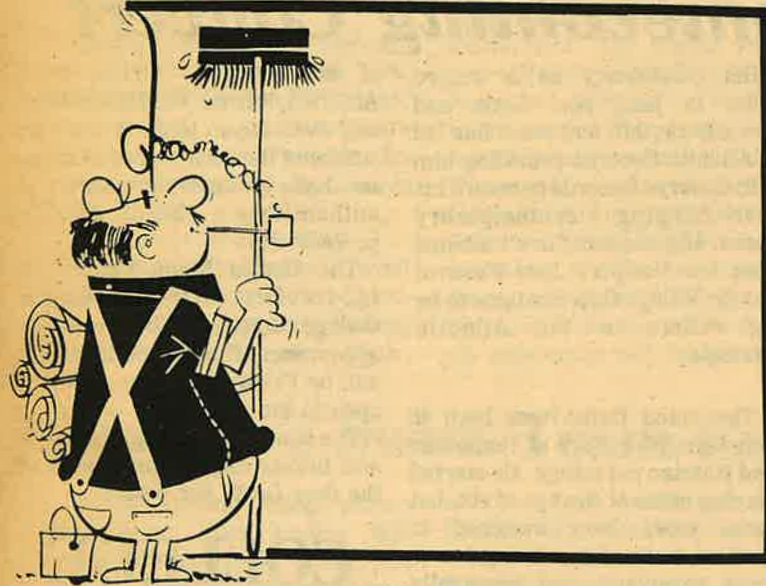

Therefore, when someone asks that I print something which might hurt or only needlessly embarrass someone, I must decide what course of action I must take.


I did not appoint myself editor of the Signals. There exists on this campus a Publications Committee. That committee is composed of The Director of College Relations—Sam Neal, Vice President for Development — Carl Dahlberg, Vice President of Student affairs — Dr. Clyde Evans, Mrs. Harrison (on leave 1972-73), Vice President of Finance—Wm. Smeltzer, editor of the Signals — Nancy Myers, editor of The Grandion — Melody Egglestone, and one student representative — Tom Sime. The purpose of that committee is "to supervise the planning, writing, editing, and publishing of all college publications" ... and to appoint editors for the Signals and the Grandion."

I was appointed by the Publications Committee; while my immediate advisor is Gordon Morrow, head of Lab Journalism 111. My other advisor is Sam Neal, newly appointed, director of College Relations. I was not just arbitrarily placed in my position. I was appointed for lack of anyone else. It is my responsibility to determine what is proper for the paper and what is not. It is less a right than a responsibility.

In regard to the request that I insert material for the sole reason that the person who submitted it was a student, I say his request was unreasonable and it lacked good taste and common sense.

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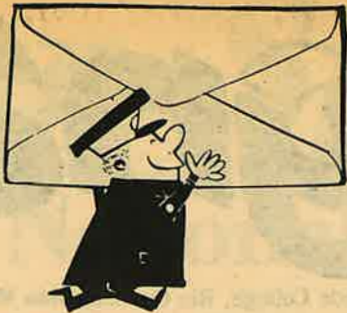

Resident Assistant Openings

positions are now being filled for a resident assistant-interim in Davis Hall, and assistant internships in Davis and Moulton Halls. A selection committee will be composed of representatives from the halls in which the positions are to be filled, a resident assistant selected at large, and resident directors. This committee will submit their recommendations for the selection of a Vice President for Student Affairs, Vice President for Student Affairs, stated that the position of resident assistants is a very serious matter since the resident assistant in accepting the

position must be ready to assume some major responsibilities to the students of a particular floor in a residence hall. A student should not apply unless he is ready to limit many of his co-curricular activities so that he will have the time to devote to the position. On the other hand the position can be rather rewarding both personally and monetarily.

The basic qualifications for the position are as follows:

1. The resident assistant must maintain at least a 2.00 cumulative grade point average and must not be on academic probation at the time of application.
2. The resident assistant should

have served as a resident assistant intern for a period of one semester before assuming official duties as a resident assistant.

3. The resident assistant must not have been on disciplinary probation for at least 4 whole semesters prior to submitting his application (2 summer terms equal 1 semester).
4. The resident assistant should have attended Rio Grande College for at least two semesters before beginning term of employment.
5. The resident assistant must be willing to work under the binds of the minimal conditions of employment for Rio Grande College resident assistant that are listed in the Residence Hall Staff Manual.

He was vice-president of the German-American Club while stationed in Stuttgart, Germany, and served in 1972 as general chairman of the Gallipolis River Recreation Days Festival.

Rio Redies For Homecoming Game

Homecoming 1972 is underway. The campus has been besieged by banners and signs announcing the different fraternities' candidates for Homecoming Queen. Last-minute preparations for parties are being made. Dates are being sought for Friday night's concert. And the Rio Redmen are preparing for Saturday night's climax when they take on Wilberforce College.

The Redmen will be making their home debut fresh from the West Virginia Tech Warm-up Tournament, in which they finished second. The Redmen easily

defeated Phiblant 102-80, but suffered a heartbreaking 91-86 double-overtime loss to West Virginia Tech in the championship game of the tournament.

Despite the loss, the team had a fine first showing, and it may well be a sign of things to come. Coach Lanham and the team have set themselves two goals for the 1972-73 season, one being the Mid-Ohio Conference Championship and the other being a berth at the NAIA finals in Kansas City. The Redmen definitely have the talent to have a fine season. Despite the loss of four starters from last year's squad,

this year's team is not too scarce on experience. Captain Ron Lambert is the only regular returning starter. The 6-4 junior forward received honorable mention Mid-Ohio Conference. Both Steve Bartram and Doug Hart saw starting positions at guard last year, and Bernard Williams, the only senior on the squad, saw starting action at center last year. Sophomore Mike Rouse, a 6-5 forward, also saw plenty of action last year in an alternating role. Dale Thompson, a 5-11 sophomore guard, saw action

last year as a playmaker and floor leader of the team.

There are six newcomers on the varsity team this year. Forward Dave Poling is a 6-5 transfer student from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, where he was a starter last year at guard. Dean Fausnaugh, a 5-10 junior guard, was a member of last year's JV team, as were sophomores Mike Wade, a 6-4 forward, and Steve Clark, a 6-6 center. Two freshmen made the varsity squad; Mike Rose, a 6-1½ guard, and Jim Stewart, a 6-7 center.

With talent, experience, and youth, things look good for the 1972-73 Rio Grande Redmen basketball



team. The key to a season, however, will be ability to work together.

Rio Grande faced Wilberforce twice last year. In the first Wilberforce won out by point, 89-88. But Rio Grande over Wilberforce in the meeting, winning 110-92.

The varsity game is this Saturday at 6 p.m. by the junior varsity game at 7 p.m.
