Discuss College **Presidents**

At a meeting held in the cafeteria during convecation Wednesday, Alphus Christensen, President of Rio Grande College, dispelled all rumors of a merger between Rio Grande College and Ohio University.

According to President Christensen, "We are going to establish a Community College on the Rio Grande campus if the voters are willing next spirng."

All Rio Grande students are urged to register to vote by Oct. 10, so they will be able to make their opinions known.

If the proposed Community College goes into effect, instructional fees for a full time resident student will be \$630 per year. Students living outside the district, made up of Gallia, Jackson, Meigs, and Vinton counties, will have \$75 added to their fee, making the cost \$705. Out of state students will not be able to pay the reduced Community College fee. Their tuition will be the regular \$850, as will be the tuition for Juniors and Seniors.

The Community College will be comprised of a two year course with an Arts and Sciences Division, a Technical Program, and a division of Adult Education.

Students wishing to continue their studies beyond the two-year course can transfer their credits to the regular college.

The only change that will affect

the students when the Community College is established is that the academic year will be divided into quarters. This will in no way hurt present Juniors or Seniors.

Doug Fields, Student Body President, also spoke during Convocation, informing the student body about voter registration. He wants all students to realize that the Community College is a political issue, not only a higher education issue, in Southeastern

In order for the Community College to become a reality, it must be passed by the Rio Grande College District which is made up Vinton, Meigs, Jackson and

of all students.



(Continued from page 1) Gallia counties. A special election will be held in the spring for this purpose.

The deadline for voter registration in Gallia County is October 10, 1972. All students, first time or previously registered, are urged to register at the courthouse in Gallipolis. Students should get in and register as soon as possible. Transportation can be made available for those students who find it difficult to get into Gallipolis.

Rio Grande College forms a block of 600 voters, which could easily sway the election in Gallia County. Local politicians and political figureheads realize this, and the student registration drive will cause increased political activity on campus.

Previously, students of Rio Grande College were unable to vote in local elections. Now, no one can be rejected for registration as long as he meets the residency requirements.

The residency requirement for Gallia County is 30 days, and Rio Grande College students meet this requirement. Therefore, there is no reason for students not to register. This election will effect the students on this campus, and they are all urged to make their opinions known.

The Student Senate brought forth the following resolution Wednesday at the Convocation:

Whereas; Ohio University has nothing substantial to offer Rio Grande College, and

Whereas; a Rio Grande-Ohio University merger would suggest a disservice to the Rio Grande College Community, and

Whereas; such a merger would cause a net loss in the total worth of higher education in Southeastern Ohio, and

Whereas, the four county Community College would substantially improve higher education in Southeastern Ohio, THEREFORE!

Be it resolved by the Rio Grande College Student Senate, representing the Student Body,

WE ARE IN FAVOR OF ESTABLISHMENT OF THE RIO COMMUNITY GRANDE COLLEGE AND STAND AGAINST NEGOTIATIONS IN ANY FORM TOWARD A MERGER WITH UNIVERSITY.




