and "learned understanding and Lobdell, "Prison set me free-and acceptance of myself-and, therefore, understanding and acceptance of others and the world as it really is."

As part of his "conversion," Mr. Lobdell became a disciple of the Lebanese mystic Kahill Gibran, author of The Prophet. Says

upon my release the realization came upon me that life is task-and that my task was to be the disciple of Kahill Gibran..." He recites Gibran constantly and quotes Shakespeare, Voltaire, Emerson, and Edgar Allen Poe as well. LaVerne Lobdell, himself

something of a poet, proclaims that 'I believe in the worth of the bitterness mingled in each potion that I drink from the cup of life.





### Cross Country Team Still On Top

Rio Grande Redmen romped to their third straight cross country win Saturday at Cedarville with an easy 47-15 victory. The Redmen clinched first place honors by capturing the first six positions and seven of the first nine.

Redmen were led by Jack Finch and Ken Sanders. Finch from Chesapeake, placed first with a time of 28:08, while Sanders came in second with a reading of 28:13. Rio's Bruce Melton was third, Stacy Osborne fourth, Kev Honnold fifth and Eddie Sayre sixth. Ninth place went to Rio's Mike Gross.

Finch, in getting his first individual victory of the season, conquered a rain-soaked course at Cedarville, which has been drenched on and off for eleven consecutive days. Finch, who shared first place with teammate Ken Sanders against Muskingum Wednesday, was Rio Grande's top finisher a couple of weeks ago at Morehead State when the Redmen opened their season.

Rio's cross-country team put in a strong performance while finishing second in the eleven team cross country invitational at Taylor University in Indiana Tuesday. The Redmen of Coach Bruce Curtis placed second to Taylor. Taylor edged Rio by a score of 67-86. Vicennes of Indiana was third, followed by Manchester College, Nyak Missionary of New York, Greenville College of Illinois, Marion of Indiana, Spring Arbor, Michigan, Anderson and Grace Colleges of Indiana and Kentucky State was last.

Rio placed four runners in the top twenty while the victorious Taylor team had three in the first twenty finishers.

Individual honors went to Taylor University's Taylor Oliver with a winning time of 27:20.

Top man for Rio was Ken Sanders, the Queen City product crossing the finish line in 28:04. Captain Jack Finch was seventh, Stacy Osborne was 16th and Bruce Melton 19th. Bill Canfield of Rio came in 41st among the 85 runners

For Rio, it was a meet that produced many improvements from a year ago at the Taylor Invitational. Rio as a team placed fourth a year ago when Vincennes won it. Vincennes this year was third and had beaten Rio Grande just a couple of weeks ago at Morehead State. Last year, Rio's Jack Finch, was 14th, this year he was seventh; however, the best improvement was noted by Stacy Osborne, who a year ago finished in the 43rd spot, Osborne moving all the way up to 16th Tuesday.
