Students Start Campus Radio WXAN

Tune your FM dial to 88 between 6 p. m. and 1 a. m. and you may hear the sweet sounds of Rio Grande's only radio voice. WXAN an unofficial "public service" station, joined the airwaves Friday with a program of music and musical comment aimed at listeners in Rio radio land.

The "station" is the work of Dave Coffman, Brad Krings, and Champe Butler. The three pooled their equipment and know-how in an attempt to ease what they see as a shortage of desirable local commercial programming. They broadcast continuous rock and pop music for seven hours each night, breaking only for periodic station identification and occasion Greek football reports.

WXAN's broadcasting equipment consists of one wireless FM microphone donated by Mr. Ross, two tape players, a record player and a radio monitor. A loop of wire on the roof serves as a transmitter antenna, since the "real" antenna atop Holzer Hall "isn't connected right now." The "studio," located in 109 Holzer, is stocked with tapes and records which provide about 200 hours of radio listening pleasure.

According to Butler, WXAN's listening pleasure extends to "the basketball court behind the library". Right now "radio land" means mainly Holzer, Boyd, and Moulton dormitories, but the station managers would like to bring all of the campus within

broadcasting range by moving to a more central location and perhaps looping the grounds with a wire antenna. Since operation would continue at a power of less than one watt, the station would not be subject to government regulation. Butler remarked that carpeting and acoustical ceiling would be highly desirable fixtures in a new studie.

With Mr. Ross's help, WXAN plans to petition the college for official recognition. In the meantime, happy (unoffical) listening.

The highlight of the local elections for Rio Grande students is the outcome of the State Representative spot between John E. Halliday and Oakley Collins. Dear Editor:

After visiting another college campus which is slightly larger than Rio Grande College and meeting with the directors of security of a number of private institutions, I have developed considerable respect for the responsibility that our students have demonstrated toward their fellow students during this school year. At the time I am writing this letter, there have been only two disciplinary cases referred to my office for the entire school year.

The statistics of disrespect for other students and for college property (students finance the maintenance and restoration of college property through fees) at some of the colleges in our area are incredible. While Rio Grande College needs slightly more than a skeleton security department, one college of approximately two times our enrollment spends over \$130,000 a year just for security. If we had to spend \$65,000 a year for security, it would cost each student approximately an additional \$180 per year. This means that because our students do not have to sponsor a security staff of this magnitude they either receive more services for their fees or their fees are

I believe the students at Rio Grande College can take great pride in this characteristic of their campus. The Student Senate and Student Judiciary serve as leaders in the development of the campus environment but each student on the campus must ultimately assume the responsibility for this relatively healthy environment and each student should also receive the credit.


